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PART A: OVERVIEW OF MINISTRY

I. STRATEGIC NOTE

- 1. Major Achievements for 2011
- Secured adoption of the AU Resolution to support the action of Mauritius at the UN regarding our sovereignty over the Chagos Archipelagos.
- Principles/guidelines and the roadmap for negotiations for COMESA/EAC/SADC Tripartite Free Trade Area adopted.
- Obtained extension of the Continental Shelf in the Mascarene plateau (Mauritius-Seychelles joint submission).
- A strategic alliance set up with the Mozambican authorities for facilitating the sub-lease of Mozambican state land for agricultural and development purposes to Mauritian/foreign private operators in the context of the food security initiative in collaboration with MOFED.
- Following agreement signed/finalised:
 - Agreement for the hosting of the COMESA Infrastructure Fund;
 - Mauritius Turkey FTA; and
 - Text for the bilateral agreement with Saudi Arabia.
- Active involvement of Mauritius with the SADC Mediation team in the search for a durable solution to the crisis in Madagascar. Mauritius as Chair of IOC led a delegation to Madagascar in April 2011 to support the SADC Mediation process.
- Proposals for streamlining Non-Tariff Measures in Mauritius adopted by Cabinet for implementation.
- The Investigating Team under the Trade (Anti-dumping and Countervailing Measures) Act set up.
- Rules of Origin for several products have been simplified at the level of the COMESA including the single transformation rule for garments.
- Agreement of Egypt to lower the value added requirement for goods to qualify as originating from 45 to 35% obtained.
- Diplomatic relations has been established with Georgia on 3 March 2011 through the signature of a Joint Communiqué.
- The Institute of Diplomacy and Foreign Trade has conducted 9 workshops/training courses benefitting more than 350 participants from various ministries.
- Successfully contributed to different State Visits to Mauritius.
- The Patents, Industrial Designs and Trademarks (Regulations 2011) formulated.

- Mauritius elected to the:
 - UN Commission on Crime and Criminal Justice;
 - African Commission on Nuclear Energy;
 - Advisory Committee of the Human Rights Council; and
 - UN Committee against Torture.
- 2. Main Constraints and Challenges and how they are being addressed
- At international level, we are facing unprecedented challenges including the following:
 - o Changing international trade rules which has led to the erosion of preferences and ruthless competition;
 - The global financial crisis which directly impacts various sectors of the economy and which has led to the reemergence of protectionism;
 - The Euro Zone Crisis which has direct consequences on export revenues;
 - o Rising oil prices; and
 - o The global financial and euro crises have made us realize that our development policies must now be anchored on new realities and move away from the legacy of a development strategy which has remained euro-centric.
 - Cognisant of the fact those preferential markets are eroding and that economic power is shifting from the traditional West to the emerging East, Government is in the process of rebalancing our economic strategy to seize opportunities. As part of this strategy, the Ministry will explore new avenues of Cooperation and trade with new economic blocks and negotiate FTAs with the emerging economies;
- Political instability in the neighbouring states continues to be a serious impediment to trade and investment in the region.
 - The Ministry will continue to collaborate closely with the African Union (AU), SADC and the Indian Ocean Commission (IOC) to find long term solutions to problems.
- The Ministry is also involved in long protracted negotiations at bilateral and international level.
 - The Ministry will, thus, continue to forge alliances with likeminded countries in order to rally consensus on its negotiating proposals.
- The Strategic intention of the Ministry is to intensify its action to defend the right to effectively exercise sovereignty over the Chagos Archipelago and to explore all options available to ensure its early return to Mauritius and the resettlement of the archipelago.

3. Strategic Direction 2012-2014

- Steps will be taken to accelerate the process of regional integration and also to encourage cross-border initiatives in key sectors such as food security, climate change, infrastructure, ICT, renewable energy and marine resources development with particular reference to the African region.
- The Ministry will work to derive maximum benefits from the interim Economic Partnership Agreement with the European Union. It will build on the work already started by the Indian Ocean Commission. Particular attention will be given to forging and consolidating special and strategic partnerships with a view to accelerating the socio-economic development of Mauritius and also work towards the deepening of cooperation with friendly countries.
- Moreover, in the light of the challenges described above, our scarce financial resources warrant for an optimum and effective use of our assets and an integrated, holistic, coordinated and collaborative approach among all agencies promoting Mauritius abroad. The Ministry will, therefore, accelerate the economic diplomacy agenda to ensure complementarities and attract economies of scales. The focus will be on expansion of bilateral, regional and international framework, investment, promoting Mauritius as a tourist destination and educational hub and also to promote Mauritius product abroad.
